Through case studies of specific slang terms, the research highlights how context, humor, and visual elements contribute to the evolving meanings of these expressions. Findings reveal that TikTok not only serves as a breeding ground for new slang but also accelerates the process of semantic change, demonstrating the fluidity of language in digital spaces. The study further discusses the implications of these changes for communication, identity formation, and community building among users.

TikTok's unique format—short videos combined with music and visual effects—creates a dynamic environment for language innovation. Research by Hu (2021) highlights how TikTok facilitates rapid dissemination of slang, allowing terms to gain traction quickly and evolve in meaning. The platform's algorithm also amplifies certain expressions, making them viral and further influencing their semantic trajectories.

4. The Role of Context in Semantic Change

Context plays a crucial role in how slang terms are interpreted and redefined. According to Gee (2014), meaning is shaped by situational factors, including the audience and the medium. TikTok's interactive features, such as comments and duet functions, provide a context where slang can be both challenged and reinforced, leading to continuous semantic shifts.

5. Cultural Influences on Slang

Cultural trends significantly impact the evolution of slang on social media. Research by Thurlow (2003) emphasizes that slang reflects cultural attitudes, trends, and values.

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TikTok, with its diverse user base, serves as a melting pot of cultural influences, resulting in a rich tapestry of slang that reflects broader societal dynamics.

DATA ANALYSIS

A. Definition of semantic change

Semantic change in linguistics refers to the development of word meanings over time. It involves shifts in how words are used and understood, often leading to significant differences between their original and modern meanings. This change is part of the phenomenon of language shift, where words gradually acquire new or modified meanings.

Types of Semantic Change:

1. Broadening (Widening)

Occurs when a word's meaning becomes more general or covers a wider range than before.

Examples:

- > "Holiday" originally referred only to a religious holy day, but now includes any day off, religious or not.
- > "Dog" once referred to a specific breed, but now applies to all domestic canines.

2. Narrowing (Specialization)

Happens when a word's meaning becomes more specific or limited.

Examples:

- > "Meat" used to mean "food" in general, but now refers specifically to animal flesh.
- "Girl" once meant a young person of any gender, but now only refers to a female child.

3. Semantic Shift (Change in Denotation)

The word undergoes a complete shift to a meaning unrelated to its original sense.

Examples:

- > "Awful" used to mean "inspiring awe," now means "very bad" or "terrible."
- "Nice" once meant "foolish" or "naive," now means "pleasant" or "kind."

4. Melioration (Improvement)

A word with a previously negative or low status acquires a more positive or elevated meaning.

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Examples:

- > "Knight" originally meant a young male servant, now is a noble title in Western culture.
- > "Minister" once meant "servant," now refers to a government official or religious leader.

5. Pejoration (Deterioration)

A word that originally had a neutral or positive meaning becomes negative.

- "Silly" used to mean "happy" or "blessed," but now means "foolish."
- "Cunning" used to mean "clever," but now often implies "deceptive" or "sly."

6. Metaphor and Metonymy

- Metaphor: A change in meaning based on similarity between concepts.
 - \triangleright Example: "Head" (part of the body) \rightarrow "head of the company" (leader).
- Metonymy: A change in meaning based on association or closeness.
 - Example: "The White House announced..." (refers to the U.S. government, not the building).

B. Social Media

Social media is an online platform that allows users to interact, share information, and build virtual communities. As time has progressed, a platform called TikTok emerged, launched in 2016, and has grown into one of the most influential social media platforms, with over one billion active users worldwide. TikTok's main strength lies in its short video format, which encourages creativity and fast-paced communication. Its algorithm effectively spreads viral trends, accelerating the emergence of language innovations. Users engage with content through comments, captions, and video responses, creating a collaborative linguistic space where slang and new expressions flourish.

TikTok's design promotes the use of multiple modes of communication—such as text, sound, and visuals—while also fostering user creativity. At present, it ranks among the most widely used applications, particularly by Generation Z, for whom it holds strong cultural significance. Despite the constant stream of new content—most of which gains popularity only briefly—many slang terms originating from TikTok have become common on the platform and have naturally blended into daily conversations. As technology and digital platform usage continue to advance, new terms—commonly known as slang—have emerged. Slang is a form of informal language that develops within specific social groups and changes rapidly. According to Eble (1996), slang consists of casual words and expressions used to express or strengthen group identity. Partridge (2006) adds that slang reflects creativity and a departure from formal language norms.

In the digital communication era, slang has become more widespread and taken on new meanings. Digital communication—the exchange of information through electronic devices—accelerates the spread of slang (Huffaker & Calvert, 2005). TikTok, with its fast-paced and interactive content, serves as a space for the emergence of new language terms. Through videos, hashtags, and comment sections, users create and spread slang that eventually becomes part of global digital culture.

David Crystal (2013) noted that digital communication has greatly enriched the English lexicon with terms like "selfie," "hashtag," and "vlog," all of which originated from social media. TikTok has continued this trend by introducing unique syntax and grammar, such as fragmented sentences, nonstandard spellings, and abbreviations. For example, phrases like "fit check" (outfit check) and "POV" (point of view) illustrate how the platform reshapes language norms to suit fast and visually-driven communication.

Additionally, TikTok has contributed to the widespread adoption of slang expressions like "no cap" (meaning "no lie") and "slay" (used to compliment someone's excellence). While

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these expressions originally stemmed from specific subcultures, they gain massive exposure through TikTok's algorithms and global reach. The platform's fast-paced nature ensures that slang not only spreads widely but also evolves quickly, reflecting the fleeting yet impactful nature of digital communication.

C. Slang TikTok

Slang terms originating from TikTok often transcend the platform, influencing mainstream English, including spoken language, social media, and even marketing. This phenomenon illustrates how TikTok serves as a linguistic incubator, fostering creativity and shaping modern communication.
